

# Friendship and Faith...

I'm a keen sports fan and last weekend watched the American tennis player Madison Keys win her first Grand Slam tennis tournament at the age of 29. In the on-court interview, following the Australian Open final, Madison was quick to thank "her team", who had always believed in her, throughout a long career that has been punctuated by several serious setbacks.

I was struck again by the level of support that competitors have invariably received in reaching their goals. Success rarely, if ever, seems to be the work of the individual alone. Time and again specific and heartfelt praise is given to the "backroom" staff: the friends and family, the coaches past and present, the encouragers and inspirers. These people help nourish the vision of future success required to motivate the athlete through the cold dark mornings of training, the strict dietary disciplines and the prioritising of time to mind numbing practice. What might we learn from this? For me it is captured in two words: friendship and faith. These two themes come together in a quirky story of the healing of a paralytic man in Mark's Gospel (Mark 2 v1-

12). The house in which Jesus is teaching is so packed no one else can get in. Four men bring along their paralysed friend. Facing this situation they could have turned away perhaps promising to call back at a more convenient time. Audaciously they decided instead to get onto the flat roof of the house and start pulling it apart! Who knows what the owner of the house thought? At last the hole in the roof was large enough to let down the mat on which their friend lay until it reached the feet of Jesus. I try to imagine the reaction of Jesus to this strange sequence of events. I think he was probably amused and delighted, certainly he sounds it, "When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven". Friendship can encourage and sustain the faith of others. We all need support. The challenge is to ask if I am the type of friend who is prepared to "go through the roof" to bring others to the feet of Jesus? The faith of the paralytic's friends brought him to Christ. Can our faith do likewise? I'm not sure our culture prioritises friendship but it is vital in a society characterised by aching loneliness. We need friends within the community of faith to encourage us to run our race well and refocus our vision on Jesus when the going is tough. Even more so do those outside the church need friends with faith.
